Announcements:

Monica Wilcox told us about the Cancer Council research and marketing and the need for more services in the regional, rural and remote areas.

Flora of the Month:

Maree Pfisterer introduced Flora of the Month.

- Carol Lea Ficus coronata, Sand Paper Fig a locally native tree.
- Steven Wedd Blue Hippeastrum, Worlseya procera, a rare and expensive bulb. From Brazil where is hangs from remote cliffs near waterfalls
- Beth Noble *Lycoris* cvs a bulbous perennial
- Fay Bogg a collection of Acalypha cvs. A. wilkesiana with large variegated leaves – green, cream, pink & red, crinkly leaves – lime green leaves, or A. hispida with long red tassel flowers. Can grow to 2m+. Can be pruned.
- Ian Lacey Hymenocallis sp. (probably H. littoralis)Spider Lily a bulbous perennial. Likes full sun or part shade.
- Margaret Bruce Beehive Ginger, Zingiber spectabile, a clumping plant.
- Julia Bamberry Dendrobium magnum, with pendulous fragrant flowers, native to the Philippines. Julia reminded us when buying orchids find out where they originate and try an replicate those conditions.

Auction:

The auction was conducted by Hazel Sowerby.

Guest speaker:

Margaret Bruce introduced Linda Sparrow from Bangalow Koalas (started 2016). Linda has recently received an Australian Geographic Conservationist of the Year award for her work.

Tree planting started in 2019 across 6 shires and a number of properties, with 240,000 planted to date. The goal is to have planted 500,000 trees by 2025.

Working with Councils and taking advise from local native nurseries, Landcare community groups, ecologists, environmental scientists etc., to assist with species selection. The aim is to create wildlife corridors by connecting fragmented habitats.

The species vary depending on location. They are grown from seed. They are planted in at random spacing to create a natural looking forest.

The group runs workshops for children, adult and landowner workshops.

Linda told the meeting that the tree planting is the easy part, but the ongoing maintenance is important. During dry spells the new plants are watered twice weekly, weed/grass control, by spraying, around trees is carried out and wallaby guards are used where necessary (these are re-used).

Funding comes from a variety of sources e.g., '1 tree planted' a USA not for profit, Fire and Flood recovery programmes etc.

Mark from Friends of the Koalas displayed a range of native trees and shrubs, e.g., Callistemons, Melaleucas, Casuarinas and Eucalypts etc., which were for sale

Margaret thanked Linda and donated \$200 to Bangalow Koalas
